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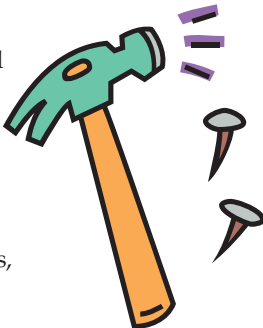
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Fall Maintenance Tasks

Fall is here and simple wear and tear from weather and age occurs in every home. Check the overall condition of your home and prep for the coming winter months. It's wise to fix any problems before they lead to extensive and costly repairs.

Outside

- Replace weather stripping and caulking around windows and doors as needed.
- Fill cracks and holes in the house siding with caulk as needed.
- Remove window air conditioners or use a weatherproof cover.
- Clean and store removable screens.
- Drain outside faucets.
- Remove leaves from gutters and drain pipes.
- Repair leaky roofs as soon as possible.
- Check the flashing on vents, chimneys, and skylights.
- Check the chimney for damaged caps and loose mortar. Check the flue and damper. If needed, have the chimney professionally cleaned.



- Do maintenance on the hot water heater as specified by the manufacturer.
- Check faucets for leaks; replace the washers if necessary.
- Clean the refrigerator coils.
- Clean major appliances according to the manufacturers' instructions.
- Check fire extinguishers. Review the instructions and replace as needed.

Furnace/Heat System Tip

Fall is a good time to check your furnace for proper operation. Turn your system to the heat function, just as you would when the weather becomes cold, and be sure it is heating properly. If you discover there is a problem, you can call a professional to address it before the cold weather arrives. If winter is upon you, and your furnace/heat system should go out, you might have to wait a few very cold days for a service person to arrive, as it will be one of the busiest times of the year for them.

Inside

- Test your smoke alarm and carbon monoxide detector.
- Change the batteries in both. This should be done twice a year.
- Have the heating system serviced and change the furnace filters.



Halloween Safety

- NEVER eat any treats until they are examined by an adult at your home.
- Carry a flashlight so drivers can see you and you can see hazards in the street as well as other people.
- Tie or sew glow-sticks to your child's costume so they can be seen more easily in the dark.
- Welcome trick-or-treaters with your porch lights and any exterior lights on.
- Candlelit jack-o-lanterns should be kept clear of doorsteps and landings.
- Consider using flashlights instead of candles to light jack-o-lanterns.
- Set a time limit for your children to "trick-or-treat." Also designate a specific route for them to take.

Pet Safety

- Don't leave your pet out in the yard on Halloween. There are plenty of stories of pranksters on this night.
- Trick-or-treat candies are not for pets. Chocolate is poisonous to a lot of animals. Tin foil and candy wrappers can be hazardous if swallowed.
- Be careful of pets around a lit pumpkin. Pets may knock it over and cause a fire. Curious kittens especially run the risk of getting burned.
- Don't dress the dog in costume unless you know he loves it. Otherwise, it puts a lot of stress on the animal.

October Home Decorating Tips

- Hollow out apples or mini pumpkins and use as votive candle holders. These are inexpensive and look really great. You can even carve or paint faces in them!
- Create creepy autumn centerpieces by filling vases with dried flowers, brown leaves, and empty branches. Tie a black ribbon bow around each centerpiece for more flair.
- Serve fresh veggies using a hollowed out pumpkin as a bowl. Cut off the top and clean out, leaving the top in a jagged edge design! Use mini pumpkins to hold dips!

SWEET AND SPICY PUMPKIN SEEDS

Spice them up by mixing:

- 5 tablespoons sugar
- ¼ teaspoon coarse salt
- ¼ teaspoon ground cumin
- ¼ teaspoon ground cinnamon
- ¼ teaspoon ground ginger
- A pinch of cayenne pepper or to taste
- 1½ tablespoons peanut oil.

ROASTED PUMPKIN SEEDS

To roast your pumpkin seeds, do not wash them first! Washing removes all the natural flavor. Instead, remove the seeds from the strings and place a single layer on a cookie sheet. Try to make an even layer. The less they lie on each other, the better they will bake.

Add salt to taste and bake at 250° until dry, stirring occasionally—usually about 15 to 30 minutes or until they start to turn a very light gold.

Prepare seeds as above, but line the cookie sheet with parchment paper. In a medium bowl combine 3 tablespoons of the sugar and the salt, cumin, cinnamon, ginger, and cayenne.

Heat peanut oil in a large nonstick skillet over high heat. Add pumpkin seeds (after baked) and 2 tablespoons sugar. Cook until sugar melts and the pumpkin seeds begin to caramelize, about 45 to 60 seconds.

Transfer to bowl with spices and stir well to coat. Let cool.
